

Student Right-to-Know Graduation Rates

Federal regulations require institutions participating in Title IV federal student aid programs to disclose graduation rates for first-time, full-time bachelor's degree-seeking undergraduate students, including rates by selected student characteristics. The information below satisfies the Student Right-to-Know graduation rate disclosure requirements under the Higher Education Act.

Methodology

Graduation rates are reported in accordance with the U.S. Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). The rates shown below represent the percentage of first-time, full-time bachelor's degree-seeking undergraduate students who entered Dakota State University in the reporting fall cohort and completed a bachelor's degree within 150% of the normal program length (six years for a four-year bachelor's degree).

Transfer-Out Rate

Dakota State University does not report transfer-out rates because substantially all entering first-time, full-time bachelor's degree-seeking students are expected to complete their educational program at Dakota State University.
